'(NB 9894 0743) Burial Ground (TI)
 'A 'very old burial ground' in a small triangular half-acre of ground between the big park and Cnoc Ghlas, at Tigh an Quay on Tanera More, contains several unmarked headstones, but the earliest inscribed stone is dated '1790'.
 'The burial ground is now disused.
 'It is doubtful if the burial ground is much earlier than the late 18th century (the earliest visible inscriptions). The local tradition of a 12th century stone is simply

(over)

due to a misreading of a mutilated '17'.

'The burial ground was allegedly used to avoid the attentions of the 'Resurrection Men'.'

'The enclosed area is marked by large stone slabs with small irregular headstones.
 'Only three inscriptions are now visible, the earliest being dated '1861'.'
